












## Library & Postal vote between 9 September & 10 October 2025

Hamilton is at the heart of who I am - I was born in the Waikato and spent all of my schooling years in Hamilton West - attending Glenview Primary, Melville Intermediate and Hamilton Girls High School. After this, I studied business at WINTEC. Over the years I have worked at a metal recyclers, at Sport Waikato, at a hydraulic engineering firm, at the Waikato Regional Council and for Parliamentary Services. I live in Hamilton West, and as such I have a grounded grassroots interest in policies which affect our people and communities.

As a first time Councillor elected in 2022, I have served as the Deputy Chair of Waikato Civil Defence Emergency Management Group, the Deputy Chair of Community Grants, the Chair of Traffic Control Hearings and the Chair of Dog Control Hearings.

Hamilton is NZ's fastest growing city which brings opportunity but also real pressure, especially with Council now carrying \$1.02 billion in debt. We need to focus on looking after our existing infrastructure and essential services, while using technology and stronger partnerships with neighbouring Councils to deliver smarter, more efficient outcomes. As your current Councillor, I proposed over \$104 million in savings, and supported a 50 percent reduction in lower priority projects, which would have saved \$75 million over three years, freeing up funding to prioritise essential projects like crossings near schools.


When residents raised concerns, I supported a new process requiring elected members to sign off on all speed bump projects to ensure stronger community input. I also supported keeping community grants after widespread public feedback. I supported retaining the ATC building for the community instead of the original plans to demolish it. Although I was outvoted, I backed retaining Founders Theatre to help address the 5,000 m2 shortfall in community space across the city.

I have a strong record of attending meetings, briefings and community events, and have worked hard to represent you in my first term, pushing for smarter spending, greater restraint, and stronger community engagement. As a local girl who has spent all her life in Hamilton I will continue to be a strong voice for Kirikiriroa.




## Hei Taniwha partnership with Te Rau Oranga





## Clean Feeders Welcome Nature

Bird feeders are a common feature in back yards and public places: it's important to take care of them. To support healthy manu and reduce disease risk, keep feeders clean, especially in predator-free zones where birds linger longer and feed more confidently.

Open dishes and containers quickly collect debris and droppings, so scrub them daily with hot water. For enclosed or specialised feeders, clean at least twice a week to prevent bacterial build-up and keep nectar or seed fresh for native birds.

Avoid bleach or harsh detergents, as residue can harm birds and disrupt feeding. Dishwashing liquid is fine if rinsed thoroughly to ensure no trace remains.

## Dinsdale Playcentre celebrates 50 years of friendship, fun and learning



This month Dinsdale Playcentre will celebrate 50 years of providing early childhood education and parenting support to hundreds of families in our community.

The centre was established in 1975, running sessions for 18 years in the converted basement of St David's Church, Rifle Range Rd. With as many as 40 families on the roll, and a limit of 18 children at a session, the popular centre often had long waiting lists. In 1990 the church indicated they needed the space for their own purposes and centre parents embarked on a 3 year journey to find a new and more spacious home.

After investigating more than 13 possible sites, including Frankton, Aberdeen, St Columba's and Fraser High schools, by late 1993 it seemed the centre would have to close. However, Hamilton City Council came to the rescue with the offer of an unused section at the end of Frederick Drive, bounded by the Waitawhiriwhiri stream. A purchase agreement was signed 2 days before Christmas and the centre opened a new purpose-built space in May

Today Dinsdale Playcentre runs 5 morning sessions a week for children from birth to school age, including a weekly swim session. Families also have the option of joining gymnastics and outdoor adventure

sessions with neighbouring Playcentres. The centre is run by the families with the support of a recently employed Kaimahi who deals with admin matters, freeing up parents to focus on their children's play and

Learning opportunities for parents is also an important part of what we do. Every term we host workshops that can be attended just for fun, or as part of the NZQA accredited Certificate in Early Childhood Education.

Fun, friendship and parent support is an important part of our centre culture, and we run regular whanau evenings for the whole family, games nights, and graduate sessions for our children who have moved on to
